THIS 5th WEEKEND of LENT as we continue to reflect on the cost of discipleship in our contemporary lives, we'll hear the story of our parishioners Denise Kavira & her son, Christian Kasimba, whose lives were upended when their husband & father was assassinated because of his work distributing food as part of a program run by the United Nations in their war-torn and impoverished homeland in Congo, Africa.

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH: All Saints Women's Taskforce spotlight this weekend is focused on St. Brigid of Kildare. Brigid held great influence in the Irish Church. She was known for her charity, wisdom, and ecclesiastical influence. When she professed vows as a nun before Bishop Mel of Ardagh, having witnessed her piety, kindness and generosity to all the poor and afflicted, he gave her also the degrees of Bishop.

At the time, the Irish Church already had *some* gender equality. For example, each tribe had "keepers" and "tellers of the law" who could be either female or male. Bishops of men's religious orders (monks) had administrative authority over those communities, while diocesan bishops had sacramental and administrative authority over laity and diocesan clergy. St. Patrick and St. Brendan, following the Roman

Church culture, challenged the role of women and, particularly, of Brigid, in the Church – but she won them over.

At the invitation of Bishop Mel and other Bishops, Brigid established a double ("inclusive"!) monastery for monks and nuns. She presided over this monastery as well as over a local church in Kildare. She celebrated Eucharist and blessed water which became a source of healing. In addition to being associated with numerous miracles, she acted as a peacemaker, settling disputes and bringing healing and reconciliation between rival factions – spreading the Gospel everywhere she went. St. Brigid's story challenges us, along with the present Catholic hierarchy, to acknowledge the history of women who have lived out Jesus's calling to all disciples to live the Beatitudes and spread the Good News. Her story verifies the truth that women are called to, gifted for and capable of ordained ministry as deacons, priests, and bishops.

As many celebrate St. Patrick's Day this weekend, let us note that the *Trias Thaumaturga* (a "History of Three Irish Saints" created in about 1788) asserts that "Between St. Patrick and Brigid, the pillars of the Irish people, there was so great a friendship of charity that they had but one heart and one mind. **Through him and through her Christ performed many great works."**

UPDATE on Parish Contribution to the Syracuse Diocese Chapter 11 Bankruptcy Agreement:

- 1. As announced previously, the Diocese has agreed to contribute \$100 million to the Victims Trust Fund per the Chapter 11 Agreement.
- 2. The Diocese itself will contribute \$50 million by taking out long-term loans.
- 3. Diocesan Parishes will collectively contribute \$45 million.
- 4. Other entities (e.g. Catholic Schools) will contribute \$5 million.
- 5. Our Parish has been asked to contribute \$259,097.00. Our Trustees, Pastoral Council & Parish Community overwhelmingly agreed to contribute to the Victims Trust Fund. At that time, the estimated figure was \$222,000. Because a number of Parishes had little or no savings and therefore could not contribute, the final figures are higher.
- 6. Our Parish Finance Committee & Trustees discerned that our contribution will come from:
 - a. Sale of 701 Crawford Ave. property = \$173,780.92
 - b. Federal Employee Retention Credit coming from the government Covid Relief Programs

Relief Programs = 79,903.00 c. Unrestricted Parish Savings = 5,414.00

Total \$259,097.00

- 7. It's important to note that *NO* funds from our Outreach Programs/Ministries, or from the Diocesan Hope Appeal Funds are being used to cover the costs of the Chapter 11 Agreement.
- 8. Most importantly, although the monetary compensation that victims will be receiving as a result of the Chapter 11 Agreement will help as they move forward in life, the Chapter 11 process and agreement is a normal process that any institution would take to protect itself financially and SHOULD NOT be construed as the Church's "reparation" towards victims (children & vulnerable adults).

In order for true reparation to take place, a process of contrition, healing & reconciliation, and continued spiritual and emotional support to victims must be on-going.



FROM our CARE for OUR COMMON HOME TEAM: "Jesus became perturbed and deeply troubled and said, 'Where have you laid him? And Jesus wept." What does it mean that Jesus wept in the light of the call to ecological conversion? God is not indifferent to the suffering of Creation & creatures – all which

God made & saw as good. Science has determined that human activity creates significant greenhouse gases, which are pushing temperatures up, impacting & even destroying ecosystems, increasing the rate of extinction for many species & threatening already vulnerable people. Laudato Si, notes that humans' irresponsible abuse of God's earthly goods have brought us to this crisis, saying "...the earth itself, burdened & laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she groans in travail." Let us ask for the courage to mourn with Jesus & turn our mourning into action. Fast from constant news & focus on one story (maybe one on climate change) that moves you. Pray for the people in that story. Act to educate yourself & others about the political positions & voting records on the environment of the candidates running in the November election.
