Chapter 11 Settlement Update: As shared previously, the Diocese agreed to contribute \$100 million to the Victims Trust Fund per the Chapter 11 Agreement. The Diocese itself will contribute \$50 million, Parishes will collectively contribute \$45 million, & other entities will contribute \$5 million. *All Saints* has been asked to contribute \$259,097. Our Trustees, Pastoral Council & Parish Community overwhelmingly agreed to contribute to the Victims Trust Fund. Our Finance Committee & Trustees discerned that our contribution will come from: Sale of 701 Crawford Ave. property (\$173,780.92); Federal Employee Retention Credit coming from the government Covid Relief Programs (\$79,903.00); & unrestricted Parish Savings (\$5,414.00) to generate the total amount.

Please note that NO funds from our Outreach Ministries or from the Diocesan Hope Appeal Funds are being used to cover the costs of the Chapter 11 Agreement. Most importantly, although the monetary compensation that victims will be receiving will help as they move forward in life, the Chapter 11 process & agreement is a normal process that any institution would take to protect itself financially and should not be construed as the Church's "reparation" towards victims. Such reparation will require <u>ongoing</u> contrition, healing & reconciliation coupled with spiritual & emotional support to victims.

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH: This weekend, our Women's Taskforce focuses on Joan



of Arc – a devout Catholic French peasant girl – born in 1431, towards the end of the so-called "100 Years War" between England & France. At the age of 13, Joan began to have visions in which she heard the voices of St. Michael, St. Catherine & St. Margaret. In one of these visions, she was directed to support



the French King Charles VII who was under siege by the English monarchy. Since she was a peasant girl, illiterate & lacking any status in those medieval times, it took many months of pleading to finally persuade a relative to take her to the French court & present her mission to

the nobles. She was first examined by French clergy who were impressed by her humility & sincerity; and so reported to the King that she was sincere in her belief that she was sent by God to help him. She was finally seen by the King & able to persuade him to allow her to ride with him into battle to inspire his soldiers. She had no weapon but was given some armor and a horse and she carried a banner. For *practical reasons* (!) she sometimes wore men's clothing and cut her hair short. She was injured twice during several battles. In the end, the French army was victorious and the English were determined to capture Joan, which they eventually did. She languished in prison under deplorable conditions for two years. She was finally put through a trial that lacked the due process of the times but was still found guilty of heresy and witchcraft. At the age of 19 she was burned at the stake for her "sins." The Catholic Church in France, however, venerated her for her obedience & courage in following the *call God had directed to her* and for helping to liberate her homeland. Joan became a candidate for sainthood in 1902 and was canonized in 1920 by Pope Benedict XV. She is the patron Saint of France. Her story challenges us all – including the institutional Church – to examine our thinking about embracing or imposing restrictive, traditional gender roles; as well as thinking which places limits on who *God may call* into servant leadership *based on human concepts of gender*.

WHO IS THE HOLY SPIRIT?? 50 days after Easter the Christian Community marks the Feast of Pentecost – celebrated as the promised "descent of the Holy Spirit" on Jesus' gathered disciples. Our Parish Bible Study groups will engage in a 6-week study of Biblical References to the Spirit. Beginning the week of April 14, on Tuesday evenings and Wednesday mornings, we will share lessons on texts mentioning the Spirit in the Old Testament; then during the first three weeks of May we will study references to the Holy Spirit in the New Testament, culminating in the Feast of Pentecost on May 19. Mary Jureller will guide the groups in examining how these texts, together with the Church's prayer and liturgical practices, led to a full inclusion of belief in the Trinity in the 4th Century. FROM our CARE for OUR COMMON HOME TEAM: In this final week of Lent, we are invited to sit in the tension between the Kingdom of God that is present to us already and that which is yet to come. We feel the joy of the Palm Sunday procession and wait for Easter, knowing the end of the story already: that God has triumphed over sin and death. Yet, we wait and work for the coming of God's Kingdom in a broken world. Maryknoll Sr. Marvie Misolas writes, "the readings [for Palm Sunday] remind me of the story of a farmer leader with whom I collaborated on a seedling production project outside of the city of Manila, in the Philippines. Her husband had been killed by powerful politicians, yet she continued to speak out for justice. She received numerous death threats from landlords & other farmers accused of land grabbing. Despite the danger & fear she with her family experienced, she chooses to continue to defend her communities' rights to the land." What piece of climate injustice are you ready to defend against?




